


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Foreword

Achieving our priorities

The past year has demonstrated the resilience of the rural communities near SSE Renewables' assets. They increased their drive to ensure their regions build back better by developing initiatives to stimulate their local economies and support net zero. Thanks to the skills of residents, the projects we are funding are becoming more ambitious and provide longer lasting impact. As we supported this growth, it motivated us to do even more with our community funds and we achieved the following priorities in 2021/22:

Transformational projects – communities are striving for larger and longer-lasting projects. A range of projects were completed this year which will provide the infrastructure, assets, and economic boost to benefit communities for generations to come. From community owned housing in the Scottish Highlands (p10) to business hubs in South Lanarkshire (p11), it is clear to see the impact of projects which would not be possible without renewable investment.

Tackling the cost of living – there have been unprecedented challenges on community finances over the past year. We listened to recommendations from local and national stakeholders and focused on issues which will make a long-term impact on reducing costs for communities, in particular energy efficiency measures (p6). In addition to the grants we are providing now to support communities with the immediate cost of living crisis, we will continue to build out renewables at pace as the most affordable way of generating electricity.

Revised Community Benefit Policy in Great Britain -

Following enhancements in the renewables market, SSE Renewables has amended our community benefit policy to reflect the need for support to communities as they achieve a net zero future. We will offer £5,000 per MW

for new Great Britain onshore developments and this will be index linked to ensure additional value. In addition. we will continue to establish a framework which offers communities the opportunity to partner with us through sharing the value of our sites, where appropriate.

Renewable Electricity Support Scheme (RESS) (Republic of Ireland) – the Irish Government introduced mandatory community benefit funds set at €2/MWh for all generation projects successful under RESS 1. The funds must be used for the wider economic, environmental. social, and cultural well-being of the local community. We have supported the consultation on the new scheme and will ensure we meet all requirements for our future wind farms.

COP26 – we were proud to be a principal partner of the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties (COP26) summit in Glasgow. While pandemic restrictions limited plans to have communities visit the gathering, we did ensure that the importance of community was prominent from hosting a session on Dogger Bank's community benefit at the Energy Transition Hub, sharing knowledge of sustainable communities with Nordic delegates to facilitating a community climate debate in Moffat.

Priorities 2022/23

Net zero transition – the community funds will play a vital role in supporting local communities to realise their net zero ambitions. The priorities of each fund will include net zero transition from the start of 2022/23.

Tackling the cost of living – we will continue our work with local and national stakeholders and focus on energy efficiency support which will help provide long-term reduction in living costs. We are actively engaging with Scottish Highland community partners and seeking to test new energy efficiency approaches in the region.

New sites – we anticipate 2022/23 will be a year of growth for community investment with a pipeline of new sites across Scotland and the Republic of Ireland. We will continue to engage with the local communities to ensure that new funds are responsive to their local needs.

Completion of Beatrice Community Fund – As the first offshore community benefit fund administered by SSE Renewables, we will ensure that the social impact of the fund and lessons learned from the experience are captured for other communities benefiting from future offshore wind developments.

SSE Renewables' funding approach

We seek to be a responsible funder, committed to ensuring our funding is enabling and transparent, for both the projects we support and the communities we serve. This is identified through our core funding principles:



Place-based funder – focusing on the areas near our renewable development sites and the specific needs of the communities within these



Community decisions – believing that local people know their community best and ensuring funding decision-making for local funds will be made by local community representatives.



Lasting legacy – working with communities to understand what their priorities are and focusing on funding projects which provide what they need, now and for the future.



Flexible funding – understanding that the environment around projects can change and being able to respond guickly to reguests for amendments to budget spend or project priorities.



Responsible relationships – providing honest and transparent guidance at all stages of funding. Working collaboratively with funded organisations to network, access expert guidance and share best practice.



Facilitating project development – providing funding for core personnel and to provide organisations with the opportunity to innovate and develop. Providing the initial funding needed to enable a project to test concepts and allow these to grow and develop.



Understanding our impact – committing to understanding the difference our funding makes in formats which are easy to use for funded organisations and sharing the learning from our

The regional funds support the local authority areas in which we operate wind farms and help to share the value of renewables by investing in transformational projects which will support communities for years to come. The funding decisions are made by independent panels.

The regional panels had been concerned at the start of the pandemic that many of the projects which had already been awarded funding may not be able to reach completion. We took steps to minimise this risk including extending grant award lengths, increasing flexibility on grant spend and providing a small amount of contingency funding. We are delighted that we have enabled all 51 of the projects funded by the Sustainable Development Fund prior to the pandemic into operation.

The focus for the funds in 2021/22 has been on supporting economic and social recovery from the pandemic and projects which supported skills growth and asset creation were prioritised. It was also positive to see the emerging theme of projects looking to mitigate against the climate emergency. In 2022/23 the Sustainable Development Fund will operate in the Highlands and North Lincolnshire and the priority area for investment will be projects which support a net zero transition.



Supporting community net zero ambitions

£443,000 awarded from Sustainable Development Fund in 2021

Many rural regions have evidenced the negative consequences of climate change including the devastating 2021 floods in Hawick, The Sustainable Development Fund has helped projects take climate action. Clyde Gateway received £170,000to develop a district heating system in the Shawfield regeneration area of South Lanarkshire. Berwickshire Association for Voluntary Services received £35,000 to decarbonise community transport services. The new electric fleet will benefit 5,000 customers a year. Ettrick and Yarrow Community Development Company and Oxton War Memorial Hall both got funding to decarbonise the heating of their community assets. The momentum shows small steps by individual projects can collectively make a net zero impact.

Local funds





The local funds ensure those living closest to renewable assets are the main recipients of community benefit funds. All decisions are made by local people either through panels of community members or local development trusts.

In 2021/22 the focus for the local funds was ensuring communities continued to thrive after the pandemic. Many projects which were delayed due to pandemic restrictions have now become operational and we have identified a trend in projects which support well-being. It is evident that many communities are becoming more ambitious and developing substantive projects to support community needs for generations. In 2022/23 we expect to see a continued increase in larger projects and in projects which re-connect residents in social events.

Community action during the pandemic

One of the concerns for communities during the pandemic was how assets which had been closed for many months could be reopened safely in 2021. Voluntary Groups Sutherland was awarded £4,200 from the Gordonbush Community Fund to co-ordinate legionella checks and risk assessment for the reopening of 16 halls in Sutherland. This helped residents to attend social activities with confidence.





Building homes for the future

£1.2m donated from Stronelairg Wind Farm Ltd Community Fund


A lack of affordable housing has become a widespread problem for many rural communities. In response, Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company has built green homes for future generations. The housing development consists of 12 properties ranging from starter flats and retirement homes to family villas.

The homes were built to be as eco-friendly as possible with high energy efficiency achieved through air source heating. Locally sourced stone from an adjacent borrow pit reduced transport costs and emissions. The development includes cycle stands to encourage active travel and the grounds are landscaped with over 500 trees and shrubs. In addition to the Stronelairg funding, £238,000 was donated from the Bhlaraidh Community Fund and £115,000 from the Sustainable Development Fund.

Consulting with communities

SSE Renewables has been operating community funds for over 15 years. Our experience tells us that a community consultation carried out when a fund is being set up can make a significant difference in ensuring success of that fund. That consultation should be revisited regularly during the fund's lifetime.

Community consultation is identified as a priority in Scottish Government's 'Good Practice Principals for Community Benefit' as it is a mechanism to capture a community's aspirations and ambitions. The exercise helps ensure the community fund is focused on the themes which are most important to residents. Experience shows that there are some key approaches which make a consultation successful: when the consultation process is led by an impartial body; when inclusive engagement approaches are used with residents; and when there is effective communication on the outcome of the consultation.

In 2021, two community funds have been involved with consultations:

Shetland Community Benefit Fund, who manage the Viking Community Fund, have scoped the aims and unambiguous objectives of their community consultation, and secured an independent agency to undertake the work. The consultation will be the largest conducted by a community fund as it will cover all 18 Community Council areas of Shetland and utilises an engagement approach that is inclusive to residents of remote islands. The consultation activity will take place in 2022.

Stratherrick and Foyers Community Development Trust completed a consultation to ensure the funding they receive from the Stronelairg Wind Farm Ltd and Dunmaglass Wind Farm Ltd funds meet the needs of residents. The consultation identified that wraparound care for children and better transport connections were important to the community. The Trust ensured the findings were shared through an information evening and the publication of a special community newsletter.



Offshore funds











SSE Renewables has the largest offshore wind development pipeline across UK and Ireland and works with Joint Venture partners (P49) to deliver impact to the coastal communities near our assets.

2021/22 saw the growth of both the Dogger Bank Community Fund in north east England and Yorkshire and the Seagreen Community Fund in Angus. In 2022/23 the focus will be on the provision of careers services in Dogger Bank schools and the conclusion of the Beatrice Community Fund.

Enabling inclusive experiences

£20,800 awarded from Beatrice Moray Partnership Fund

The community of Dornoch has taken action to ensure their beach is as inclusive as possible. They have improved the accessibility of the playpark, introduced sensory experiences and, thanks to the Beatrice Partnership award, have become the first Highland community to offer an all-terrain electric wheelchair. The robust chair allows people to enjoy the outdoor activities to their full ability. The chair enabled many people to safely experience the beach for the first time in years.

Northern Ireland



SSE Renewables is Northern Ireland's largest generator of wind power and operates community funds for three wind farms: Bessy Bell, Tievenameenta, and Slieve Kirk Wind Park.

Investing in good health and wellbeing

The Recreation and Exercise Centre

Tievenameenta Community Fund

The covid pandemic continued to be a focus for communities over the last year. Community groups across Northern Ireland had to adapt to new guidance on how they could re-open their services safely for participants. The Recreation and Exercise Centre in Ederney utilised a £3,000 donation to purchase additional exercise equipment for their gym. The new equipment meant that participants could maintain social distance within the gym and allowed for additional cleaning for materials in between uses. The equipment will continue to be used to encourage additional participation in exercise after covid restrictions end.



Republic of Ireland





SSE Renewables is the Republic of Ireland's clean energy champion with 700MW of operational onshore wind farms. These include Ireland's largest wind farm, the 174MW Galway Wind Park in Connemara, County Galway, which is co-owned with Greencoat Renewables.

Sustaining rural emergency services

Irish Air Ambulance

Coomacheo and Curragh Community Fund

A common area of focus for the communities benefiting from wind farm funds is how to maintain vital services within rural settings. A key concern for community members is ensuring that they can access expert support during times of an emergency, and this is evidenced by €10,500 funding having made to the Irish Air Ambulance The service is an integral part of Ireland's frontline emergency response network, responding to 500 incidents a year.
