Technical Appendix 10.1: Additional Cultural Heritage Assets in the Inner Study Area

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- 1.1.1. This appendix provides details on additional cultural heritage assets recorded within the Inner Study Area ('the Site') identified through desk-based assessment and walk-over field survey, together with an assessment of their heritage sensitivity.
- 1.1.2. A refreshed Historic Environment Record (HER) dataset from the West of Scotland Archaeology Service (WoSAS) on behalf of Argyll and Bute Council (A&BC), was obtained in January 2026, and further field survey was carried out in February 2026. This identified eight new heritage assets within the Site, in addition to those previously identified by AOC Archaeology for the 2018 EIA Report (SSE Renewables 2018).
- 1.1.3. Newly identified cultural heritage assets recorded within the Inner Study Area have been detailed in **Table 10.1.1**. These have been renamed with the prefix 'CFA' to distinguish between those previously recorded in the 2018 EIA Report.
- 1.1.4. This appendix should be read in conjunction with 2018 EIA Report, **Volume 4, Appendix 13.1** and with **Volume 2, Chapter 10** of the S36C Report. The locations, and extents of the recorded heritage assets are depicted on **Volume 3a, Figure 10.1**.

Both features are located c.15m north of Tangy Burn and c.435m west of Tangy farmstead which they may be an outbuilding of. By the time of the second edition OS map (1900) the two features are removed and later Killarow Cottages appear to the direct north (AOC Site 17). No visibility on modern aerial photography in what is now an improved field on the western edge of the main farm track but there may be the possibility for building remains to sit sub-surface. By the time of the later second edition map (1900) the dam has been removed but possible unmarked sluice remains. From modern aerial photography, a modern farm track has been built directly to the south of the burn, but no dam and sluice remains are visible.	Negligible

It has a south-east-facing entrance, and some stone is visible under the banks at the entranceway. The enclosure measures approximately 5.2m long by 4.5m wide and 0.75m high.
