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Foreword

Communities at the centre of renewable heritage and future.

SSE Renewables is proud of our long heritage of working with communities. The Hydro-Electric Development (Scotland) Act of 1943 enabled us to support communities facing post war challenges by ensuring there was secure electricity sources for residents to continue to live and work in the rural north of Scotland. We provided the jobs, homes and community assets needed for rural communities to thrive. During 2023 we celebrated the 80th anniversary of our hydro heritage and to mark this milestone we are launching a new £10 million Hydro Community Fund which will invest in the assets and services the hydro communities need to cope with the challenges and opportunities of the 21st century.

Renewables can provide significant socio-economic benefits to the regions in which we operate. 10 years ago, we introduced regional community funding, this ensures we tackle significant rural challenges. In December I was enlightened when I met the communities supported by the Sustainable Development Fund and they discussed the transformation of building new homes, securing local jobs for young people, and participating in community owned renewables. It is clear regional funding provides a lasting impact, but the size of the region must be proportional to ensure this impact is not diluted. The voice of the community was resolute, and I remain committed to championing community wealth building. The renewables sector faces the future with optimism, we remain focused on our commitment to deliver 20GW by 2030. In 2023/2024, we installed the first wind turbine at Yellow River Wind Farm which will be our second largest wind farm in Ireland and reached full commercial operations at Scotland's largest offshore wind farm, Seagreen. We are progressing with ambitious projects from Coire Glass Pumped Storage, Arklow and Berwick Bank Offshore Wind Farms and Littleton solar project. We recognise the challenges we face from lengthy consenting processes to rising construction costs, but we reflect on the obstacles successfully overcome by our predecessors in the creation of Hydro, including the Tunnel Tigers. We remain committed to our future growth and importantly to continuing to work responsibly with the local communities.



Achieving our priorities

2023-24 has been a year of reflecting on the past decade of delivery, including the £13.5 million invested by the Sustainable Development Fund, and sharing our learning. We continue to focus on the future and have embedded new systems and practices which ensure we continue to meet the needs of local communities for the decades to come.

Regional funding – SSE Renewables believes in sharing the value of renewable assets within a local region. This ensures there is lasting impact which supports both the community and local economy. We marked the 10th anniversary of the Sustainable Development Fund in December 2023 with a showcase event and the publication of an impact report (P6). The event captured priorities for the next decade of community investment.

Viking Community Fund – SSE Renewables and Shetland Community Benefit Fund (SCBF) have signed a Minute of Agreement for the operating of the Viking Community Fund, contributing £72 million to local communities. SCBF published a business plan which highlights how the first five years will focus on six priorities identified by Shetland residents (P14).

New grant management system – We have implemented a new grant management system (P21). We have worked closely with the developers, Bluewave, and software provider, Salesforce, to develop a robust and community focused grant management system which enables all data to be captured safely and securely. The new system will enhance our reporting on ESG and social impact requirements.

Onshore Wind Sector Deal – we welcome the Onshore Wind Sector Deal in Scotland and have ensured we achieve the actions for our new community fund including launching the Viking Community Fund in 2024 under these enhanced actions.

Hydro Community Fund – to mark the 80th anniversary of our hydro-electricity assets we will launch a new £10 million community fund for the communities nearest our hydro assets. We will recruit a panel of local representatives to make funding decisions and will also facilitate an independent consultation to identify how some of the funding can support enhanced STEM education and careers in local regions.

Community benefits good practices guidelines – We will continue to work with the UK, Scottish and Irish Governments to share learning and recommendations for the development of community good practice guidelines across different renewable technologies. We will ensure the new guidelines are promoted with local communities and embedded into our practices.

Community benefit consultations – We have actively participated in a range of government and industry consultations on the future of renewable community benefit, including for onshore wind in England, solar and offshore wind. We have advocated for core principles including community control of decision making, funding to remain in the regions hosting the assets and consistent reporting on impact. This is an on-going priority, and we will continue this work in 2024-25.

Shared ownership – We have continued to work with the communities near the Strathy South wind farm. The discussions have not progressed at the pace either SSE Renewables or the communities would have wished but we are committed to further progress in 2024-25.

International provision – SSE Renewables has embedded our community commitments into our international developments including for Chaintrix-Bierges and Vélye in France where we have established a partnership with the Association Française d'Agroforesterie and embedded renewable education in local primary schools. We have continued to share our learning and impact with international stakeholders including the World Bank, the Nature Conservancy and the United Nations Global Compact.

Priorities

2023/24

Offshore community funds – we are committed to working with local communities to continue developing the community benefit priorities for our future offshore wind farms including Arklow in Ireland and Berwick Bank in Scotland. We will also support local partners with the early stages of the community activity for Akita Prefecture in Japan.

Shared Ownership – we have commissioned Development Trust Association Scotland to publish a paper in 2024 on the role of the Community Benefit Society governance model and democratic community led finance in community shared ownership.

SSE Renewables' Community Commitments

SSE Renewables is an international developer and operator, and we pledge to deliver impactful commitments to communities across the countries in which we operate.

Core to our operations are the following principles:



Value based approach – our commitment to communities and sustainability is embedded in our corporate values.

Focused on communities – we know local people are the experts of their own area and we will work with them to provide flexible interventions.

Transparency – we will treat communities with respect and provide honest, open, and meaningful engagement at all stages of our relationships with them. We ensure we are inclusive of all the community.



Lasting Legacy – we focus on what communities need now and in the future. We aspire to ensure that communities are left in a sustainable position after our interventions. We prioritise supporting communities' areen transition.



Good Governance – we commit to an approach which builds trust with communities and uses proportionate management approaches. Based on the specific needs of both the United Kingdom and Ireland we further deliver to the following principles:



Place-based funder - focusing on the areas near our renewable development sites and the specific needs of the communities within these areas. We ensure agency for the specific needs of the local area.



Flexible funding - understanding that the environment around projects can change. We respond quickly to emerging local issues and changing priorities.



Social Impact – we commit to using proportionate and meaningful measures to report on our impact against the UN Sustainable Development Goals and on our sustainability commitments.

Local funds – empowering the communities nearest to wind farms to develop and enhance the services, assets, and activities their residents need now and for the future.

Regional funds – sharing the benefits of renewables with wider communities. The regional funds invest in transformational projects which provide socio-economic growth for lasting impact.

Scholarships – supporting local students undertaking STEM degrees to ensure local regions have the workforce of tomorrow.

Skills projects – ensuring that communities have the skills they need for the future including training projects for school children, employment schemes and apprenticeships.

We are committing to capturing the social value of our community investment. It is important that the renewable sector can demonstrate the positive change investing in commitment has. We are proud that we are leading the sector in social evaluation.

When empowered with investment, communities ensure they provide positive and lasting local change. Every project funded by SSE Renewables identifies how they support the UN Sustainable Development Goals, and we capture impact studies. This approach helps communities to understand the difference renewables investments make in their local area and enables communities to learn from each other.

SSE Renewables commissioned New Economics Foundation to develop a social impact measurement approach. It enables us to understand and to provide evidence of the difference made by the projects that we fund. The approach captures the Social Return on Investment of our funds. This is demonstrated in the Decade of Social Impact report for the Sustainable Development Fund (P6). We also commission external partners to evaluate and capture the learning of our funds, as shown by Ekosgen's evaluation of Dogger Bank (P18).

We have enhanced how we share our impact with communities and stakeholders.

10 years of impact for the Sustainable Development Fund

SSE Renewables established the Sustainable Development Fund to help share the benefits of our onshore wind farms with regional communities beyond those closest to its renewable assets. The fund operates in Highland, South Lanarkshire, Perth and Kinross, Scottish Borders, North Lincolnshire and Dumfries and Galloway. 2023 marked 10 years since the fund opened and the impact of the fund over the first decade has been captured. It is evidenced that focusing investment on regions helps enhance the local economy and provide lasting impact on the key themes facing rural regions including enhancing skills provision, reducing depopulation, and reducing fuel poverty.

Showcasing communities

In December 2023 an event in Edinburgh brought together funded projects, community representatives, policy makers and renewable energy developers to share the learning from the Sustainable Development Fund. The participants learnt directly from communities on how the funds had helped them overcome local issues and a panel discussion involving Edinburgh University, Scottish Renewables and South of Scotland Enterprise Agency discussed the priorities for community investment in the next decade. Key actions from communities included the need to continue focusing on the regions closest to renewable assets and the requirement to increase capacity building investment in local areas.



Demonstrating impact

Social Return on Investment (SROI) is a method of accounting for value creation, primarily social or environmental value. SSE Renewables commissioned New Economics Foundation Consulting to develop a SROI approach and methodology which analysed the impact of seven projects funded by the fund. The study found that for every £1 of community funds spent, the community projects are expected to generate £10.95 in wider value for society. The projects were selected to represent the key themes of the funding and included a community hydro project, an apprenticeship programme, a skills programme, and a museum development.

11 SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND COMMUNITIES



Building homes for the future



£945,000 invested from the Sustainable Development Fund in 13 projects

Across all rural regions one of the main priorities is ensuring that they can remain as places where people want to live and work. Many communities are experiencing the double impact of an ageing population that needs adaptable housing and a lack of available, affordable homes for families. The Sustainable Development Fund has supported a range of community-led projects which are building homes to meet the future needs of residents. These projects have shown as some of the most impactful for communities.

The community of Staffin in Skye was facing concerns about its sustainability due to rising house prices and depopulation. Staffin Community Trust developed an ambitious project to attract families to the area by building six homes offering a mix of those for affordable rent and discounted sales, for local families and those with connections to Staffin. The Sustainable Development Fund provided an early investment of £99,000 in 2020 which helped attract over £682,000 in additional funding.





4 QUALITY EDUCATION

Enhancing rural education and skills

A central component of the Sustainable Development Fund is improving education and skills outcomes for young people. It is recognised there are divergent opportunities between rural and urban areas and the fund wanted to improve equality of access to viable career opportunities within rural regions. The fund has invested in opportunities which encourage young people to remain within local areas from STEM acceleration projects, rural skills apprenticeship programmes to careers mentoring initiatives. Young Enterprise Scotland (YES) aims to ensure children in rural areas access the same provision as those in urban communities. YES received £55,215 from the Sustainable Development Fund to establish an enterprise programme in the Scottish Borders and Dumfries and Galloway. Their south of Scotland provision now includes enterprise challenges, circular economy sessions and e-learning. The programme has supported 1,464 young people to enhance their enterprise and other transferable skills for the world of work. Early investment from the Sustainable Development Fund enabled YES to develop an evidence base that helped to attract other funding and achieve financial sustainability.



2023-24 awards from the Sustainable Development Fund





2023-24 was a busy year of awards from the Sustainable Development Fund with South Lanarkshire, North Lincolnshire, Scottish Borders and Perth and Kinross all making awards. A continued focus for the fund is supporting the net zero transition and improving skills provision. In 2024-25 the fund will open in the Highlands and North Lincolnshire with a focus on rural depopulation and net zero.

13 CLIMATE ACTION

Supporting net zero enterprise

Scotland's rural economy is a nucleus for many innovative micro businesses. They provide vital jobs and services to rural communities but often lack the support and opportunity of their urban competitors. Growbiz supports entrepreneurs in rural Perthshire with a suite of services including market development, one-to-one advisors, mentoring, network facilitation and peer learning services.

A key concern of micro businesses is ensuring they learn about sustainability and adapt their services to deliver in a net zero future. The Sustainable Development Funding enabled Growbiz to develop a new training and mentoring programme including net zero education, training on measuring carbon footprints, strategies to reduce carbon emissions and support to create a net zero action plan. The initial 20 micro businesses participating in the programme will become peer ambassadors within the local business community.

Overcoming future skills shortages



£163,968 awarded from South Lanarkshire Sustainable Development Fund

The UK has a need for more engineering professionals and a more diverse engineering workforce. Research shows careers aspirations and perceptions are formed while at primary school. The Primary Engineer model is to provide training for teachers to enable them to deliver curriculumaligned, projects where all children are engaged and have opportunities to identify with engineering and construction. The project has been designed to upskill and empower teachers to deliver the engaging, cross-curricular projects with their pupils to develop, design and a build a protype. They learn key skills such as problem finding, problem solving, teamwork and communication. The Sustainable Development Fund will enable 90 schools from across South Lanarkshire to undertake the project over a threeyear period.

Fostering community care

Highland Perthshire Plus

Families with additional support needs can often struggle to access care services, especially in rural areas. Highland Perthshire Plus has developed a service to provide inclusive day care services and work experience programmes which put adults with disabilities at the heart of the Highland Perthshire community. The service runs two days per week and includes the operation of a community café and a range of skills sessions from food preparation to gardening and soap making. The support from the Griffin and Calliachar Community Fund provides core costs for three years which ensure the group has the financial stability required to retain staff and grow the service provision.

Promoting rural skills

Lochview Rural Training

To ensure we have thriving rural communities we need to have a workforce which reflects the diverse range of skills needed in the rural economy. Lochview Rural Training promote, organise, and deliver rural learning across Sutherland. The funding from the Achany Community Fund has provided two years of core costs to support the social enterprise to grow and development. The group has focused on working with 769 local residents and providing a range of rural courses including crofting, livestock management and drystone walling. The provision of quality training within local areas is vital to maintaining young people within local communities. Lochview Rural Training work alongside local schools to provide employment routeways for young people and facilitate a young crofters network.



Ensuring a legacy for Shetland

Shetland Community Benefit Fund



The Viking Wind Farm will provide enough renewable energy for 475,098 homes and will also contribute over £72 million to Shetland communities through the Viking Community Fund, which will be managed by Shetland Community Benefit Fund. The fund is the largest renewable community benefit fund in the UK. To ensure the Fund focuses on the key priorities of the local community an extensive community consultation was completed involving every household in Shetland. This has resulted in a business plan which will direct the first five years of the fund. The business plan ensures the principles of the fund are for legacy, environmental sustainability, and equity to help address some of the disadvantages that come from living in Shetland. The Fund will focus on the following six priorities identified by the consultation:

- 1. More younger people wanting to stay and/or return to Shetland.
- 2. Better transport links within and between communities.
- 3. Reduced cost of living in Shetland.
- 4. Better broadband and / or mobile phone connections.
- 5. Improved housing supply and affordability.
- 6. Preservation and enhancement of Shetland's natural environment.

The fund will be delivered through a community grant scheme which will support small, grassroot community projects and a strategic scheme which will emphasise legacy projects and activities including the development of a new programme for young people.

Re-invigorating local communities



Tweedsmuir Community Company



£22,578 awarded from the Clyde Borders Community Fund

Destination Tweed is a unique source-to-sea river revitalisation project that unlocks the potential for sustainable and inclusive economic growth across the South of Scotland. Tweedsmuir Community Company is ensuring the voice and needs of the community is at the centre of the ambitious multi-agency project which involves Sustrans, South of Scotland Enterprise and NatureScot.

The provision will help invigorate the local area and ensure the needs of local residents are met as part of ambitious socio-economic growth. The range of projects supported cover well-being, environment, climate change and tourism. The provision of Destination Tweed could contribute an additional £3.5 million into the area over the next five years. "We were delighted to have receive an award from the Clyde Wind Farm to recruit a Development Manager for Tweedsmuir. This has allowed us to establish strong partnerships with organisations such as Tweed Forum, SUP, and Borders Forest Trust. These relationships have ensured that Tweedsmuir and the wider area capitalise on the Destination Tweed project".

4 QUALITY EDUCATION

Creating community transport solutions

Garve and District Development Company

awarded from the Fairburn Fund

Many rural communities struggle to access public transport and are required to develop community solutions to travel to central locations. When public services were cut in Contin and surrounding areas the community developed a local response. Support from the Fairburn Community Fund helped establish a demand, respond bus service running from Garve to Dingwall. The service ensures the community can travel for work, education, medical appointments, shopping and to access travel to further locations "The Fairburn Community Fund has supported the Contin, Jamestown and Tarvie Projects which has enabled the communities to form a partner with the neighbouring Garve and District Development Company to establish a demand response community transport service, to address the lack of public transport provision in the area."

Offshore Wind

SSE Renewables has the largest offshore wind development pipeline across GB and Ireland and works with Joint Venture partners (P52) to deliver impact to the coastal communities near our assets.

2023/24 was a busy year for the offshore funds with the completion of the projects funded by the Beatrice Community Fund. 2024/25 will see large legacy projects developed from Seagreen Community Fund and the start of the second phase of funding from Dogger Bank Community Fund.

Carnoustie Community Development Trust

A priority for many coastal communities is ensuring that local people can enjoy the environments on their doorstep in a way which is respectful of the local nature and is open and inclusive to all residents. The Carnoustie Green Circular project will see a 12 km circular waymarked route created around Carnoustie. The hope is that this will encourage local people and tourists to explore and enjoy both coastal and countryside views in the area, whilst learning about important local spots. The new project will help ensure that people can access nature in a way which is tailored to their own needs and abilities.

Building better futures





Dogger Bank Community Fund committed £1 million during the construction of the wind farm. The ambitious aim of the fund was to provide inspiring STEM (science, technology, engineering, and maths) activities to schools across three local authority areas. An independent evaluation by Ekosgen confirmed the programme performed very strongly across several stands and commended that the project had developed a tailored approach to STEM learning based on local need. The evaluation highlighted that support has broadened young people's horizons and raised awareness of female role-models. The programme provides a legacy of increased STEM capacity in local schools.

Supporting the elderly

A key concern for many elderly residents of rural areas is how they continue to live in their local community as they grow older. The provision of affordable and adapted housing is vital to responding to the needs of an ageing population.

The Millerstreet Centre in County Cork has provided a safe home for elderly residents for over thirty years but needed renovations to ensure it remained safe and secure. The Coomacheo and Curragh Community Fund has provided €28,238 over the last five years to improve the safety and energy efficiency of the homes. The new provision has helped eight homes to be reinvigorated and has reduced energy bills for pensioners. The provision has enabled residents to continue living near their families and friends and ensures the community benefits from the contributions of people of all ages.

A decade of supporting students



One of the first stages of developing a community fund is consulting with residents on their key priorities in the local community. One of the priorities which is raised by every community is providing opportunities for young people. Residents recognise young people are the future of their community and want to ensure they have the best start possible.

A key method to support the next generation is to ensure they receive the training and education required to enter highly skilled jobs. For the past decade the community funds have provided scholarships to local students to help them benefit from further education. The Scholarship Fund is delivered in partnership with Ulster University, South West College and North West Regional College. The fund provides up to 50% of third-level fees up to a maximum of three years to students living in Co. Derry/ Londonderry, Co. Tyrone, Co. Fermanagh, and Co. Donegal.

Over the past decade over 450 scholars have been supported by the fund in courses as diverse as engineering, science and medicine. Once they have graduated the scholars have been the doctors, nurses, and engineers at the heart of Northern Ireland's communities and vital to our economy.



Enhancing the grant management experience

SSE Renewables recognise our responsibility to look after the data shared by applicants. To ensure we meet the highest standards of data protection and to enhance the user experience of applicants we have implemented a new online Community Investment Portal.

How to create an account

To create an account and log in to the Community Investment Portal, please visit https://ssecommunity. my.site.com/s/login/ and click on 'not registered?'. You will then be asked to enter your name and e-mail address. Once you have done this, click 'sign up'. You will then be sent an e-mail to the e-mail address that you entered. Please check for the e-mail and follow the instructions within it. The username will be the e-mail address plus '.sse' at the end.

How to apply for a grant

You can find information on the funding SSE Renewables make available to communities at https://www. sserenewables.com/communities. Once you have found the fund you wish to apply to click on the button 'Apply' on the webpage for the fund. You will be taken to SSE's Community Investment Portal and presented with a set of pre-application eligibility questions. If you are eligible to apply you will be taken to the application from for the fund. You will be able to work through the application process and will be able to save your version if you do not want to submit it straight away.

You can return to a draft application or check the status of a submitted application by logging into the Community Investment Portal and clicking on 'my applications'.

How to manage a successful grant award

You can view information on your grant award(s) by logging into the Community Investment Portal and clicking on the 'my grants' section. You will also be able to view any outstanding conditions against your grant and any reports that we require in relation to your grant.






